<b>Religion /Worldview: Judaism</b>	<b>Enquiry Question: How special is the relationship Jews have with God?</b>	<b>Age: 8/9</b>	<b>Year Group: 4 Autumn 1</b>
In this enquiry, the children look at how Jews commemorate key people and key stories. They reflect on how these stories are relevant in their lives today and on the special relationship Jews believe they have with God.

<p>This enquiry takes a deeper look at the <u>Story of Abraham</u> and the covenant with God. The near sacrifice of Isaac can be explored in more depth here – why was God testing Abraham? How did Abraham respond?</p> <p><u>Moses and the Ten Commandments</u></p> <p>The Ten Commandments were given to Moses by God – they are named as</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"><li>1. I am the Lord your God.</li><li>2. You shall have no other gods before Me. You shall not make for yourself an idol.</li><li>3. You shall not take the name of God in vain.</li><li>4. Remember and observe the Sabbath and keep it holy.</li><li>5. Honour your father and mother.</li><li>6. You shall not murder.</li><li>7. You shall not commit adultery.</li><li>8. You shall not steal.</li><li>9. You shall not bear false witness.</li><li>10. You shall not covet/desire your neighbour’s wife or house.</li></ol> <p><u>The Synagogue</u></p> <p>The main place for community worship is the synagogue.
